








Climate City Contract – What?

- A governance innovation instrument which builds on the knowledge, resources and experience you as cities already have, in order to seize opportunities and overcome the barriers you face in meeting the 2030 challenge
- The objective of the CCC is to enable Mission Cities to become frontrunners and experimentation hubs for climate neutrality
- The CCC is the backbone of the EU Mission on 100 Climate Neutral and Smart Cities and all Mission Cities should sign a Climate City Contract
- Structure: 1 living document:
 - Commitments + Action and Investment Plans (Annexes)



Build a Strong Mandate – Key elements and Webinar Highlights



Within city government – e.g. Valencia, Gothenburg, Umea, The Hague

- Cross- departmental and cross- party team
- Usual (e.g. planning, transport, housing)
- + unusual suspects (health, social care, education, culture, finance)

Within the local ecosystem – e.g. Leuven 2030, Umea

- Search for common ground towards a shared vision
- Share ownership with all stakeholders of society
- Develop pathways in collaboration
- Reward engagements & go public
- Celebrate & connect with other communities

With other levels of government – e.g. Greek National Platform







Activating an Inclusive Ecosystem for Change – WHAT



Mobilise the city's ecosystem in all its diversity, knowledge institutions, innovative companies and start-ups, as well as grassroots organisations and civic innovators:

- Inclusivity: how insights, decisions, actions are carried out and communicated
- Be intentional about building and sustaining trust
- Find different ways to participate, e.g. in person and digitally
- Identify and address barriers, like childcare
- Create Connections, Alliances, and Impact Networks





Webinar highlights key lessons & top tips

- Bologna: People don't trust institutions; We need to create new institutions for new relationships of trust
- Gothenborg: It's not only about stakeholders
 participating, but also making sure stakeholders realise
 that they are, in fact, stakeholders; that they have a
 stake in the current and/or future system.
- Barcelona: Often, the cultural sector and grassroot initiatives are the "unusual" suspects when it comes to Climate Transition. But if the conditions for collaborations are right and there is space created, these unusual actors can be part of the "solution".







CCC<> Strong Mandate & Inclusive Ecosystem



A Strong mandate and inclusive ecosystem are key to the CCC, in particular Commitments

New ways of working enabling:

- Legitimacy
- Long term commitment
- Effectiveness



Ask yourself:

- Have you set up or strengthened a crossdepartmental municipal Transition team ?
- Have you mobilised resources and capacities?
- Have you started setting up a multi-actor city wide Transition team?
- Are you engaging with a wide, diverse and inclusive range of stakeholders across the city?
- Have you had chance to connect with other cities at national level and reached out to regional / national government?



Understand the System



- System = set of interconnected and interdependent patterns
 of actions involving many components: organizations,
 institutions, people, industry, and all stakeholders that need to be
 involved in the journey, as well as the tangible elements and
 infrastructures that support the system
- Emissions data > GHG emissions systems understanding will be a key element in NZC. Further details on this will be forthcoming- in the meanwhile please refer to the <u>Info Kit for Cities</u>



Understand the System – webinar highlights, key lessons & top tips



Understanding the system is fundamental to:

- Build a systemic view of the internal and external status of the municipality and its ecosystem with respect to the barriers to climate neutrality;
- Detect valuable internal and external resources and reconnect them with your strategy (building alignment) valorise your capital/s;
- Design the set of interventions to address these barriers as a portfolio of projects drawing complementarities and interdependencies between them;
- Design a suitable mechanism (strategies, tools, methods) to monitor the portfolio of projects with respect to the challenge/s addressed and the potential externalities produced: enabling for a quick reorientation of the portfolio of solutions;
- Fill gaps in terms of needed capacities, infrastructures, policies, commitments as prerequisites to your journey to climate neutrality; Enable the process of envisioning your future as a climate neutral city (building a vision).
- Example: Noiseability project, strategy for mapping citizens perceptions of sound

Co-create a Portfolio

- Portfolios are set of diverse actions across emission domains and levers of change... which are articulated and coordinated around a vision...
- They are co-designed, implemented and co-invested in with multiple actors
- Portfolios exist at many scales: a whole city portfolio may include portfolios within emission domains, districts, or even within the Pilot Cities Programme

Link with the CCC

- The Portfolio process is ongoing over time, with a snapshot of the results captured in the CCC (Action Plan), and co-evaluated & iterated continuously
- Example of a portfolio: Reykjavik mobility transition portfolio (see webinar 04/10) direct (visible) interventions, enabling (e.g. governance) actions, cross-sector
 linkages (e.g. renewable energy)



Co-create a Portfolio – webinar highlights



- There is no single way of getting portfolios right no single methodology or result.
- But it's always about connecting people (multiple actors in and outside municipality),
 connecting interventions, and steering towards synergies
- As Frazer Osment noted, raising investment for a portfolio instead of a list of projects unlocks finance at a larger scale and avoids 'cherry picking' (leaving the 'harder-to-finance' elements for later)
- As colleagues from Reykjavik and Oslo noted, coordinating a portfolio is deeply human work: bringing the right actors around the table at the right time
- Particular instruments like a coordinated 'climate budget' procedure (Oslo)
 enable rigour and acceleration, if anchored in collaborative multi-actor ways of
 working

CCC<> Understand the System & Co-Create a Portfolio



Understanding the System and Co-Creating a Portfolio are key to all the elements of the CCC, in particular Action Plan and Investment Plan

New ways of working enabling:

- looking at whole system
- Design the set of interventions to address these barriers as a portfolio of projects drawing complementarities and interdependencies between them;

Ask yourself:

- what's out there and why is it relevant to me?
- how is mapping useful for my strategic goals?
 how can I harness assets and resources to achieve a common strategy?
- how can the mapping be done collectively to gain different perspectives?
- What strategic (if suitable, portfolio based) measures address the key emission sources

Commitments - Overview



- WHAT: Contract between municipality and stakeholders: new ways of working together and concrete commitments to 2030
- WHY: to identify key priorities, address barriers and accelerate joint climate action
- WHO: city administration, stakeholders from the public, private and third sector, citizens and local communities

- Political + stakeholder commitments
- Local, regional and national levels



Signed by Mayor at a minimum + Growing number of stakeholders

1. Introduction

 Explain your city's motivation to join the EU Mission "100 climate-neutral and smart cities by 2030", highlight your city's present commitments to climate action and the aims of this document.

This section should answer the following questions:

- Why have you decided to join the EU Mission and develop a Climate City Contract?
- What have been the highlights of your city's journey to achieving climate neutrality so far?
- What is your city's current climate neutrality commitment and how can the Mission enable your city to build on what it is already doing? What opportunities does it create?





2. Goal: Climate Neutrality by 2030

Describe 2030 climate neutrality ambition. Should be supported by a Council decision at a minimum, and a wider stakeholder group (recommended)

List other co-benefits you aim to achieve when working towards the climate neutrality goal, like well-being, health, equity, justice, financial savings

This section should answer the following questions:

- What is your city's 2030 climate neutrality goal? (reference your Cities Mission Expression of Interest)
- Does your 2030 goal cover the entire administrative territory of the city or are there exclusion areas (summarise)?





3. Key priorities and strategic interventions

Core section:

- Summarise at least 3 or 4 systemic priorities and strategic interventions that need to be implemented for your city to become climate neutral by 2030.
- These should be meaningful changes that will have a profound impact on reducing GHG emissions in your city, like decarbonising the heating system in the city by 2030 or generating 100% energy from renewables (think 'portfolio')
- The individual commitments between your city and other stakeholders should address these key priorities and contribute to reaching them.
- The annexed 2030 Climate Neutrality Action Plan should describe the priorities and interventions in further detail and describe how your city plans to implement them.





This section should answer the following questions:

- What are your city's overall key climate transition priorities by 2030 What strategic interventions will you focus on in the next 2-3 years?
- e.g. Decarbonising the heating system in the city by 2030 Generating 100% energy from renewables Building infrastructure for sustainable transport
- Who are the critical stakeholders necessary to bring about accelerated change?





4. Principles and process

- Highlight the key principles that will guide your city as it implements its Climate City Contract, like accountability, transparency, or an open attitude to new approaches.
- The process should encompass principles like co-creation, innovation, multi-actor and citizen engagement, and should be systemic and demand-driven in nature.
- It should also be based on monitoring and joint learning.
- The Commitments Guidance document provides more specific guidance on how integrate these principles into your own process (for example along the CTM phases)





5 and 6. Signatories and signatures

 Include a list of stakeholders who have committed to help your city achieve its goal to reach climate neutrality by 2030. Detailed commitments and agreements between individuals or groups of stakeholders should be appended to this Commitments document.

[NB Getting the signatories on board is likely to be the most time consuming element. It can be iterative, add more in future versions of the contract.]





7. Individual agreements

 Specific agreements that articulate the details of the climate action(s) between the municipality and other stakeholders (individual or groups) can be added to the Commitments document appendix.

[Can take a variety of forms, but the more specific and measurable the more effective for shared accountability]
